Vitamin Angels believes that micronutrient malnourishment is at the heart of human, economic and social underdevelopment. Simple supplement interventions are a foundation strategy to address nutritional gaps and help break the cycle of intergenerational poverty by improving health, educational achievements, and economic productivity.

Dear Friends,

"It is simply unacceptable that a child goes blind from a simple vitamin A deficiency," our friend Robert Orr (Ocean Nutrition) said during our Celebration of Angels event in 2007. This is how everyone at Vitamin Angels feels – it is simply unacceptable that malnutrition is responsible for one-third of child deaths worldwide. This year's study on child and maternal health in *The Lancet* has alerted the world to the scope of malnutrition and its devastating effects. Vitamin A, in particular, has been singled out as the largest contributor to the child disease burden among micronutrient deficiencies.

In 2007, Vitamin Angels launched its most far-reaching program yet, Operation 20/20, combining vitamin A supplementation with deworming tablets to help children across three continents fight premature death, disease, and childhood blindness.

We have reached deeper into the world's poorest areas to transform lives. Vitamin Angels itself as an organization is undergoing major transformation. In 2007 we expanded our staff and operations to meet increasing requests for nutrition supplements from people, governments, and organizations around the world.

We are deeply grateful to our contributors and partners who have stepped forward to help make our vision of a world of healthy children, a reality.

Operation 20/20

In July 2007, Vitamin Angels launched a global vitamin A and deworming initiative, Operation 20/20. We reached more than **7.1 million children** and lactating mothers in 17 countries across three continents.

High-dose vitamin A capsules, just two cents each, administered twice a year **lower deaths** among children 6-59 months by **23%**, and among children 0-6 months by a groundbreaking **20-64%**.

In conjunction with Save the Children, our principle field distribution partner, Vitamin Angels has joined the worldwide movement to prevent child mortality due to measles, diarrhea, and acute respiratory infection. Vitamin A deficiency debilitates the body's ability to fight these easily curable diseases.

Vitamin A deficiency afflicts 100 to 140 million children and is responsible for as many as one out of every four child deaths.

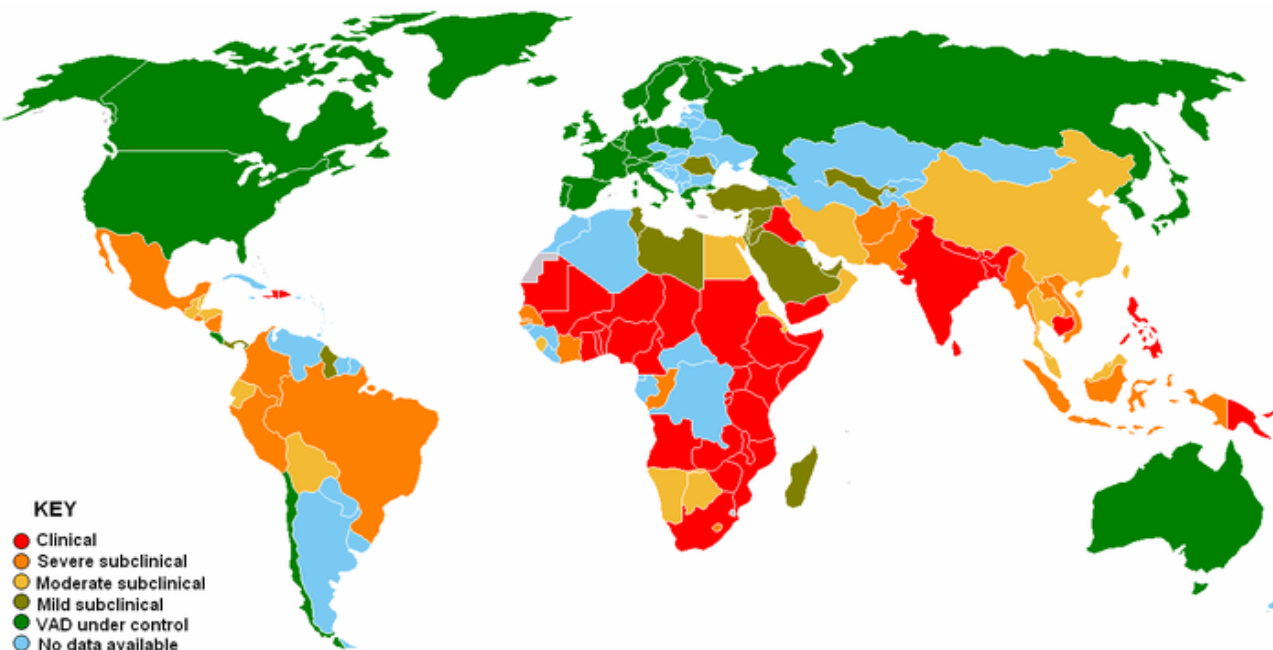
Vision impairment and night blindness are the most indicative symptoms of VAD, the leading cause of preventable **childhood blindness**.

Eleven out of 17 countries in Operation 20/20 have been recognized as priority countries for vitamin A supplementation due to their under-five child mortality rate, which exceeds 70 deaths per 1,000 live births.

In Belize, the Ministry of Health serves as our in-field distribution partner, and in vast India, 29 locally-based NGOs distribute product provided by Vitamin Angels to rural and urban communities difficult to reach through formal networks.

Operation 20/20 alleviates VAD by providing health workers with donations of high-dose vitamin A for distribution to children, ages six months to ten, and lactating mothers. We also provide chewable tablets of albendazole or mebendazole, deworming tablets that improve absorption of vitamin A and other micronutrients.

Together, vitamin A and deworming tablets ensure that the generation of children now at risk obtains sufficient stores of vitamin A to assure their survival and healthy development.



Operation 20/20

LATIN AMERICA

BELIZE

In November 2007, with support from UNICEF, World Health Organization (WHO), and Pan American Health Organization (PAHO), Vitamin Angels launched the Belize Vitamin A / Childhood Blindness Prevention Campaign to reach 25,000 children in the Toledo and Stann Creek districts. This five-year program is sponsored by SPINS, Presence Marketing, and Pharmaca Integrative Pharmacies.

BOLIVIA

Vitamins were delivered to 575 schools in western provinces, which are primarily populated by indigenous Bolivians who often represent the poorest and most marginalized people in the country. 58,000 children are being dosed twice yearly with vitamin A. Flooding created an emergency in Beni, which necessitated the use of deworming tablets for 39,000 school children in the area.

EL SALVADOR

A pilot program to provide vitamin A to 4,000 children under the age of five began in 2007. Severely subclinical rates of vitamin A deficiency afflict this central American country, in which micronutrient-poor corn, rice and beans are dietary staples, and in which production of coffee for export monopolizes agricultural land. The children also received antiparasitics to improve their vitamin A absorption.

HAITI *

In 2007, 66,000 children under the age of five, 72,000 school-age children, and 21,000 lactating mothers were supplied with initial doses of vitamin A. Malnutrition and vitamin deficiencies are at dire levels in Haiti. To the children reached, Operation 20/20 is making a critical difference.

NICARAGUA

As one of the poorest countries in the Western Hemisphere, government health programs in Nicaragua are often forced to make decisions which compromise one health issue over another. Our critical donations help the Ministry of Health redirect some of its resources to help other problems affecting the country's children. Vitamin A and antiparasitic distribution are reaching 500,000 children throughout the nation, primarily through community-based health centers.

AFRICA

BURKINA FASO *

Via the school system, 375,000 children received vitamin A and deworming tablets in Burkina Faso. The program focuses on cognitive function and provides support for students' education and welfare.

MALI *

The program has begun distributing deworming tablets twice annually. Like most of sub-Saharan Africa, children suffer from clinical rates of malnutrition. Operation 20/20 protects these children through schools, utilizing teachers as volunteers.

MALAWI *

Operation 20/20 has become a critical intervention to reduce child mortality, which is high in Malawi. Through the Children's School Health and Nutrition Program, 101 schools in the Malawi program will protect 50,000 children ages 6-59 months under the age of five.

MOZAMBIQUE *

Implemented through Save the Children's health program, Operation 20/20 focuses on child health programs in Mozambique. Community workers visited home and village to reach 720,000 young children and 110,000 lactating mothers in Nampula and Gaza Provinces. The program focus on children 6-59 months and lactating mothers.

UGANDA *

Operation 20/20 reached 175,000 children in 2007. Formal education is improving despite the country's low level of development. Our vitamin A and deworming tablets are distributed by the school network.

SUDAN *

The Sudan is one of the priority countries for vitamin A supplementation, and has a very high under-five mortality rate. Despite enormous challenges facing the country due to political and economic turmoil, Operation 20/20 has solid foundations for the health, nutrition, and leadership of 40,000 school age children.

ASIA

INDIA *

Vitamin Angels expanded efforts in India over years of presence in India to reach rural and urban lactating mothers with vitamin A. The program focuses on maternal health, the program provides deworming and medical facilities with the vitamins and medications needed to reach the most vulnerable children of India, where vitamin A deficiency is a major health problem in teeming urban slums.

INDONESIA

In 2007, vitamin A and antiparasitics were distributed to children at health posts in the Belawan and Medan Arnplas sub-districts, areas still recovering from the tsunami disaster. The program is reaching 320,000 children and 60,000 lactating mothers and their babies. The government's vitamin A program has begun to integrate Operation 20/20 into its nationwide strategy.

MYANMAR*

Medical teams supplied by Vitamin Angels with vitamins and antiparasitics have begun reaching 343,000 children and 7,000 lactating mothers throughout the country. Once the wealthiest nation in southeast Asia, decades of military rule have resulted in a fragile economy that places Myanmar as one of the least developed countries in the world, with clinical rates of vitamin A deficiency. The program is helping to alleviate the micronutrient needs of the many children who rely almost exclusively on rice for food.

NEPAL*

More than 3000 community health volunteers and 1000 school teachers reached 333,000 children this year in Nepal, expanding the current government program. By providing vitamin A to children under 5, the program now guarantees supplements to school age children who have benefited from vitamin A in the past under the Early Childhood Development campaign. Our donations of antiparasitic drugs have allowed the Nepalese to redirect funds toward iron supplements for the entire program area.

PAKISTAN*

Early Childhood Development Centers began distributing vitamin A to 835,000 lactating mothers, a strategy that bolsters the mothers' reserves as well as their young infants. In addition, supplement and antiparasitic distributions to 385,000 children began. Community-based health centers played a supporting role in helping to administer the program to targeted children and mothers.

PHILIPPINES

Deworming tablets reached 250,000 children in current project areas in Bicol in southern Luzon, which has recently been affected by three super typhoons; in southern Leyte province; which has been affected by landslides; and in the many displaced communities in Sulu province where rebel and military operations are going on.

VIETNAM

Operation 20/20 has been fully integrated with Vietnam's national nutrition program, and is being distributed every six months through networks established by the National Institute of Nutrition (NIN). 376,500 children under five and 2,000 lactating mothers have been served through the donation, providing coverage to nine provinces of the country. This substantial donation has assisted the Vietnamese government in its goals of achieving full vitamin A supplementation coverage for children under five nationwide.



Children's Nutrition

MISSISSIPPI

Ruleville, Mississippi is a very poor rural district in the Mississippi Delta. Many children come from families living beneath the poverty line and many others go to school each morning without breakfast. With the support of Univera and their Serve First Program, Vitamin Angels began a supplement nutrition program for school children in August 2006. In 2007 we reached 2,000 children in the Ruleville Elementary School with a daily nutrition supplement, Ageless Essentials. Absenteeism has been substantially reduced since the program began.

Since the children started taking daily multivitamins, absenteeism has been reduced from 2,000 student days per year to 92 student days per year.

“The people on the bateys were Haitians brought in as migrant labor. They were never recognized by the government – they are the invisible population. Even today, decades after they arrived, they have no rights, no documents, no health care or education by the government. Their situation is deplorable and desperate.”

DOMINICAN REPUBLIC

In 2006, Vitamin Angels partnered with United Natural Foods and the Batey Relief Alliance in the DR to create a children's nutrition program that would reach the unreached children in the Bateyes. The Bateyes are the slums leftover from colonial sugar plantations. UNFI has provided the sponsorship for this program designed to bring daily multiple vitamins, along with twice a year deworming medicine, to 55,000 Batey children living in absolute poverty.

In 2007, the second year of the program, Tishcon Corp. and Pharmachem provided 11 million children's multivitamins for the Batey children. BRA has been able to distribute the multivitamins and antiparasitics to 55,000 children with the help of the Secretaría de Estado de Salud Pública (SESPAS).

HONDURAS

Vitamin Angels began a 3 year pilot program in 2006 to reach 55,000 Honduran children with daily multivitamins along with twice a year deworming medicine. The program in Honduras is sponsored by Sight & Life, with Anabolic Laboratories providing the children's multivitamins.

In 2007, partnering with Cristo Salva, the Ministry of Health, and the Pan American Health Organization (PAHO), Vitamin Angels expanded the program to include school children in Macuelizo. Honduras is the poorest country in Central America. In 1998, Hurricane Mitch caused such massive and widespread loss that former president Carlos Roberto Flores claimed that fifty years of progress in the country were reversed.

Maternal Health

WORLDWIDE

Vitamin Angels supports donations of prenatal vitamins to distribution partners worldwide. Taken regularly, the vitamins prevent hemorrhaging during childbirth, and help ensure healthy, well-nourished newborns. Maternal vitamin deficiency contributes to low birth weights, stunting, susceptibility to disease, and increased chance of infant mortality. A simple bottle of prenatal vitamins can assure a safe delivery of a healthy baby.

The women told us they were pleased with the impact of the prenatal vitamins on their babies' health and lactation. Epifani told the entire community that she was able to give more milk for her baby this year, providing her child a chance to live and to grow normal and healthy. Felicitas had already lost two babies due to malnutrition and poor health. The morning after we arrived, Felicitas delivered a boy – the largest and strongest child of her five deliveries, and possibly one of the largest babies in the village. The women credited their babies' health to the prenatal vitamins donated through Vitamin Angels.

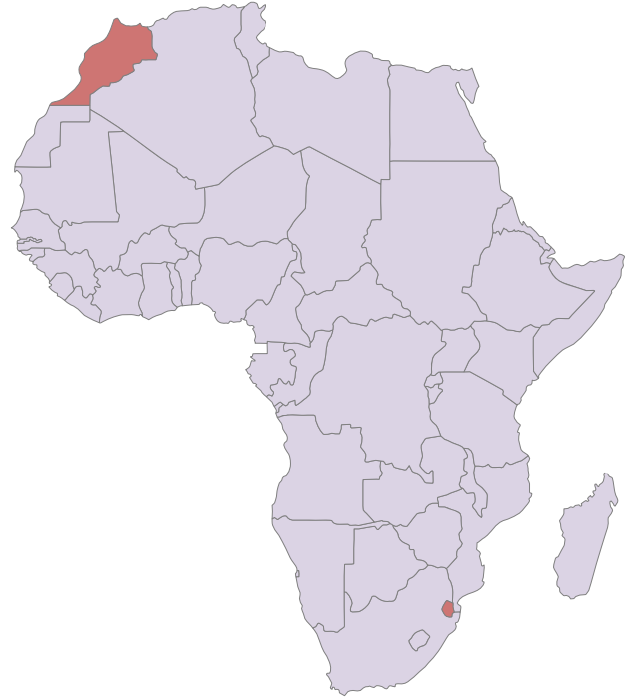
AFRICA

MOROCCO

Bridge to Morocco

Bridge to Morocco has operated in the country for three years and runs a medical clinic 100 miles from the nearest formal medical facility. The remote location is home to 25,000 people, of whom Bridge to Morocco treats 1,500-3,000 per year through its medical center, mobile clinics, and by tapping into highly participatory "local associations." Bridge to Morocco has a primary focus on mother/infant and children's health and nutrition.

Donations: 4,000 prenatal vitamins and albendazole, 55,080 DHA
Recipients/year: 250 children



SWAZILAND

Cabrini Ministries

Cabrini Ministries provides an orphanage and health clinic in the Lumbombo region of Swaziland. The clinic's primary focus is on treating HIV, AIDS, and tuberculosis among women and children. The organization treats low T-cell counts, provides formula to HIV nursing mothers, provides home visits, anti-retroviral treatments, and adult and children's multivitamins.

ASIA

BURMA

Shanta Foundation

The Shanta Foundation is a nonprofit organization working in small villages in the mountains of Myanmar to enhance basic standards of living. Through mobile outreach clinics, the Shanta Foundation provides health education, nutritional services, dental, and emergency care to rural populations.

Donations: 18,000 prenatal vitamins
Recipients/year: 700 children, 30-50 pregnant mothers

CAMBODIA

Wesleyan Medical Missions

Wesleyan Medical Missions is part of the Wesleyan Church of America, and relies on healthcare volunteers for its missions around the world. In June 2007, the organization traveled to rural areas of Cambodia to provide aid and education for malnutrition, hygiene, parasites, and safe drinking water. The two week trip provided multivitamins, deworming medication and health seminars through mobile outreach clinics, and serviced six-hundred villagers.

Donations: 30,000 children's multivitamins, adult multivitamins, prenatales, antiparasitics, and vitamin C
Recipients/year: 200 children, 200 adults, 200 pregnant mothers



INDIA

Grassroots Asia

Grassroots Asia is a donor agency working with partners in Asia to address child welfare, basic care, and emergency relief. Grassroots Asia works with Pranjana Mission in the state of Orissa, where there is widespread malnutrition and high infant mortality rates. Pranjana Mission operates mobile clinics in the towns of Puri and Cuttack, and travels weekly to surrounding villages. The health clinics treat malnutrition, malaria, diarrhea, and provide maternal health care. In 2006, the mission saw 58,000 patients in 2006.

Donations: 680 various vitamins

INDONESIA

BALI

Yayasan Bumi Sehat: Healthy Mother Earth Foundation

Yayasan Bumi Sehat is a nonprofit birth clinic offering prenatal, childbirth, and postpartum health care in the Balinese village of Nyuh Kuning. The organization provides gynecological, obstetric, and vitamin supplementation services to rural women suffering from malnourishment and anemia; it facilitates healthy pregnancies, full term babies, and healthy births and postpartum care.

Donations: 6,000 prenatal vitamins

Recipients/year: 480-600 pregnant mothers

NEPAL

Giving Asha

Giving Asha focuses on women and school aged children in the capital city of Kathmandu, and has operated in Nepal since 2004. The organization works to improve children's education, health, nutrition, access to medical care, and family assistance. Giving Asha's associations include Parizat Nestling Home, Sechen Clinic, and the Himalayan Dental Relief Project. Vitamins are distributed through clinics as well as school programs.

Donations: 10 bottles children's chewable vitamin C

Recipients/year: 1,000 children

LATIN AMERICA

DOMINICAN REPUBLIC

LDS Humanitarian Services

LDS Humanitarian Services is philanthropic wing of the worldwide LDS church. In the Dominican Republic, LDSHS works closely with the Batey Relief Alliance and rural public schools to administer vitamins and deworming medication through school breakfast/lunch feeding programs. The program relieves undernutrition and malnutrition, and continues throughout the school year.

Donations: 2,492,086 children's multivitamins

Recipients/year: 52,000-60,000 children

Building Bridges of Hope

The Holy Spirit International Ministry began working in the Dominican Republic during November 2002. Working in the mountainous "frontier" region of the Dominican Republic/Haiti border, it provides relief to poor rural Dominicans, as well as Haitian refugees. The ministry supports an outpatient clinic in the Dominican village of El Llano, as well as a mobile clinic which travels to rural villages with medicine, vitamins, and food, and addresses malnutrition, parasites, mother/infant health, iron deficiency, and infectious disease.

Donations: 180,000 prenatal vitamins

Recipients/year: 960 pregnant mothers

GUATEMALA

Adonai International Ministries

Adonai International Ministries has worked in and around Canilla City in the southwest of Guatemala for eight years. It operates three regular weekly clinics, various outreach clinics, and home deliveries for rural Latin and Mayan populations, with a primary focus on mother/infant health. The organization focuses on pediatrics, gynecology, obstetrics, emergency care, and nutrition, particularly in infant and toddler aged children.

Donations: 72,000 prenatal vitamins

Recipients/year: 9,000-10,000 pregnant mothers

Casa Colibri

Casa Colibri is a newly established rural clinic in the Municipio de Barillas in Huehетенango, Guatemala. The clinic offers free services to the indigenous Mayans living along the Chiapas, Mexico border region. Casa Colibri offers primary health care, pediatrics, health education, nutritional counseling, family planning, immunizations, orthopedics, gynecology, and obstetrics to people who otherwise have no access to these services. The clinic treats dehydration, malnourishment, maternal mortality, intestinal parasites, skin diseases, gastroenteritis, and childhood diseases.

Donations: 6,000 prenatals, infant drops with iron

Recipients/year: 250 children, 50 pregnant mothers, 250 adults



Faith in Practice

Faith in Practice is a large medical mission organization focusing on the city of Antigua, Guatemala. The organization has a strong affiliation with Hermano Pedro Hospital and provides advanced medical care to large numbers of rural Guatemalans. The medical mission teams travel to Antigua for one week and offer surgery at the hospital, as well as multiple outreach clinics which travel to villages throughout the area.

Donations: 1,555,200 children's multivitamins

Recipients/year: 4,000 children, 1,600 pregnant mothers, 12,000 adults

Roswell Presbyterian

Mr. Jack Macey travels to Guatemala several times a year and is connected with a Samaritan hospital in Chichi. The medical missions focus on indigenous Mayans from the surrounding area and treat 500 people per week of travel, 400 of which are children.

Donations: 400 albendazole; 1,500,960 children's multivitamins

Gospel Outbound

Gospel Outbound has been in operation in Chichicastenango, Guatemala for 14 years. The organization is associated with the Father's Health Clinic in the mountains of Guatemala, primarily serving rural Mayans. Through medical missions, Gospel Outbound offers primary health care, pediatrics, general medicine, health education, nutritional services, and eye care at its medical facility and through outreach clinics. The clinic also provides a "milk program" which tracks mothers and infants monthly and provides vitamins, formula, powdered milk, and health education.

Donations: 1,200 albendazole

Recipients/year: 3,000 (600/visit)

HONDURAS

Global Medical Brigades - Boston University

In 2007, the Boston University chapter of the Global Medical Brigades traveled to Tegucigalpa, Nuevo Paraiso, and surrounding villages in Honduras. The team set up mobile outreach clinics and operated through rural clinics and provided primary health care, pediatrics, general medicine, gynecology, health education, and nutritional services to rural populations. The clinics travel to each village once every six months and treat malnutrition, infections, anemia, diarrhea, vitamin deficiencies, intestinal problems, and parasites.

Donations: 135,600 prenatal vitamins; 327,600 children's multivitamins

Recipients/year: 1,680 children, 200-300 pregnant mothers, 1,120 adults

Global Medical Brigades – University of California, Santa Barbara

In 2007, the University of California, Santa Barbara chapter of the Global Medical Brigades traveled to Alao, Hoya Grande, Montana de Luz, Coyolito and surrounding villages in Honduras. Through mobile clinics the team provided primary health care, pediatrics, general medicine, gynecology, health education, and nutritional services to rural populations. The brigade's primary focus was battling malnutrition due to poverty, and had a goal to provide a month's worth of vitamins to each patient.

Donations: 2,400 albendazole

Recipients/year: 1,043 children, 50-100 pregnant mothers, 730 adults

NICARAGUA

Dr. JoAnn Quattrone – "The Garden of Living Food"

Dr. Quattrone is a retired dentist and holistic health counselor, and for the last 7 years has traveled the world to help children in malnourished environments. In 2007, Dr. Quattrone worked with Nicaraguan orphanage groups to treat intestinal problems, parasites, respiratory infections, malnutrition, and vitamin and mineral deficiencies. Dr. Quattrone also helps orphanage groups develop their own gardens of "living food," educating caretakers and children on growing their own organic food supply, the importance of nutrition, and promoting sustainability and self-esteem.

Donations: 70,000 children's multivitamins

Recipients/year: 1,000 children

PERU

Heart Walk Foundation

The Heart Walk Foundation has focused on remote Q'ero villages in the Andes Mountains of Peru since 2004. The organization's primary focus is on promoting self-determination, self-sufficiency, skill building, micro-enterprises and empowerment, while preserving native cultures and traditional community living.

Donations: 257,520 prenatal vitamins

Recipients/year: 1,000 children, 200 pregnant mothers, 50 adults

Humanitarian International Services Group

Humanitarian International Services Groups (HISG) is a non-governmental organization specializing in resource mobilization and management, and mediating between large institutional networks. HISG provides support services to US and international for-profit and non-profit organizations for humanitarian and developmental initiatives. Worldwide, HISG works with hundreds of non-governmental organizations, corporations, faith-based groups and civic groups throughout the world.

Donations: 150,000 prenatals

Lucress and Dick Watson Children's Foundation

The Watson Children's Foundation is private donor organization out of Texas. Currently the foundation has 8 partner clinics, one each in the Central African Republic, Kenya, Liberia, and the Democratic Republic of the Congo, and two each in Nicaragua and Haiti. The foundation qualifies partner organizations around the world which have trained medical staff at established clinics servicing rural populations, with primary focuses on children's health and nutrition, measles, diarrhea, pneumonia, and malaria.

World Ministries

World Ministries travels in large medical missions to countries throughout the world, reaching thousands of people every year. The organization focuses on poor regions and reaches people in both rural and urban areas. World Ministries operates within local and rural clinics, as well as outreach clinics, and addresses poverty, nutrition, and general health.
